The directors of the Consolidated Milk Exchange met last week and decided to advance the price of milk half a cent a quart, the advance to take effect October 1. The advance brings the price to three cents a quart. A further advance is expected next month. The prices given by the Bordens has acted as a pusher to the exchange, which sees that to get the supply they must advance the price.

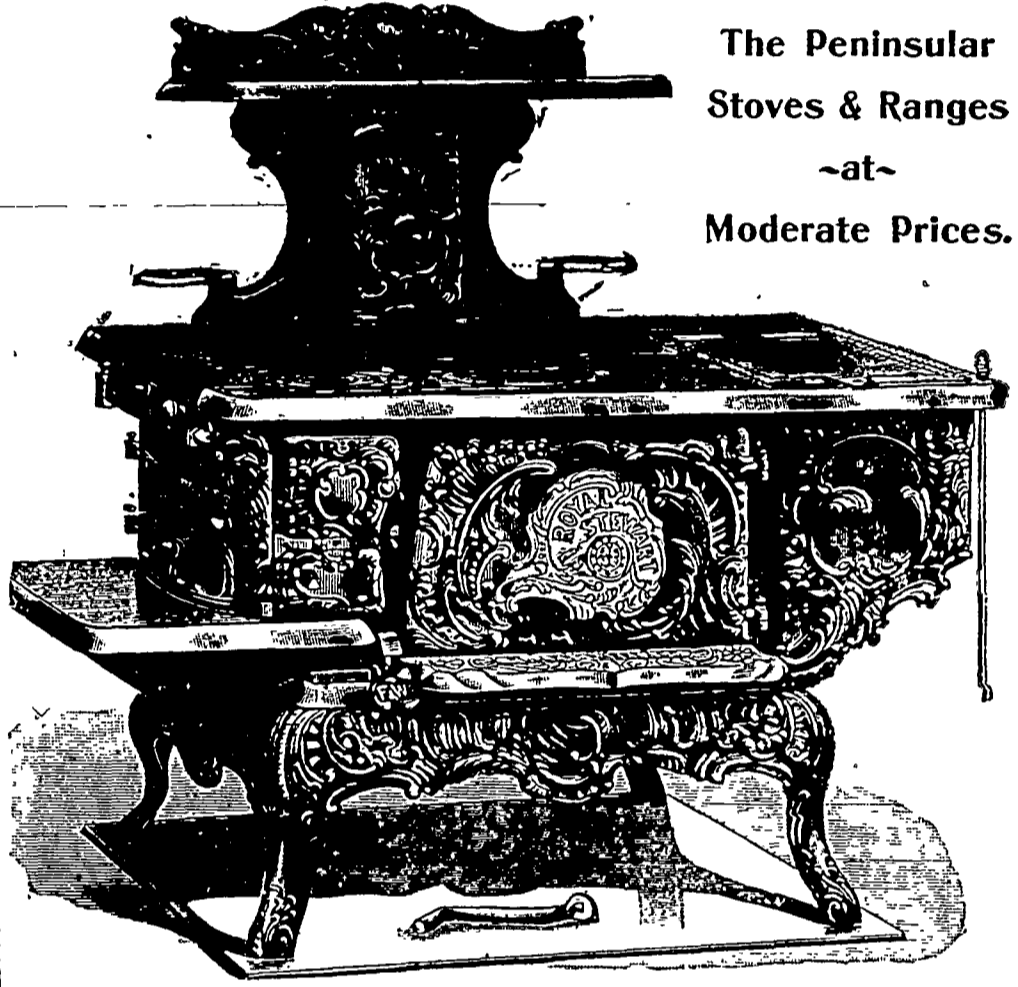
