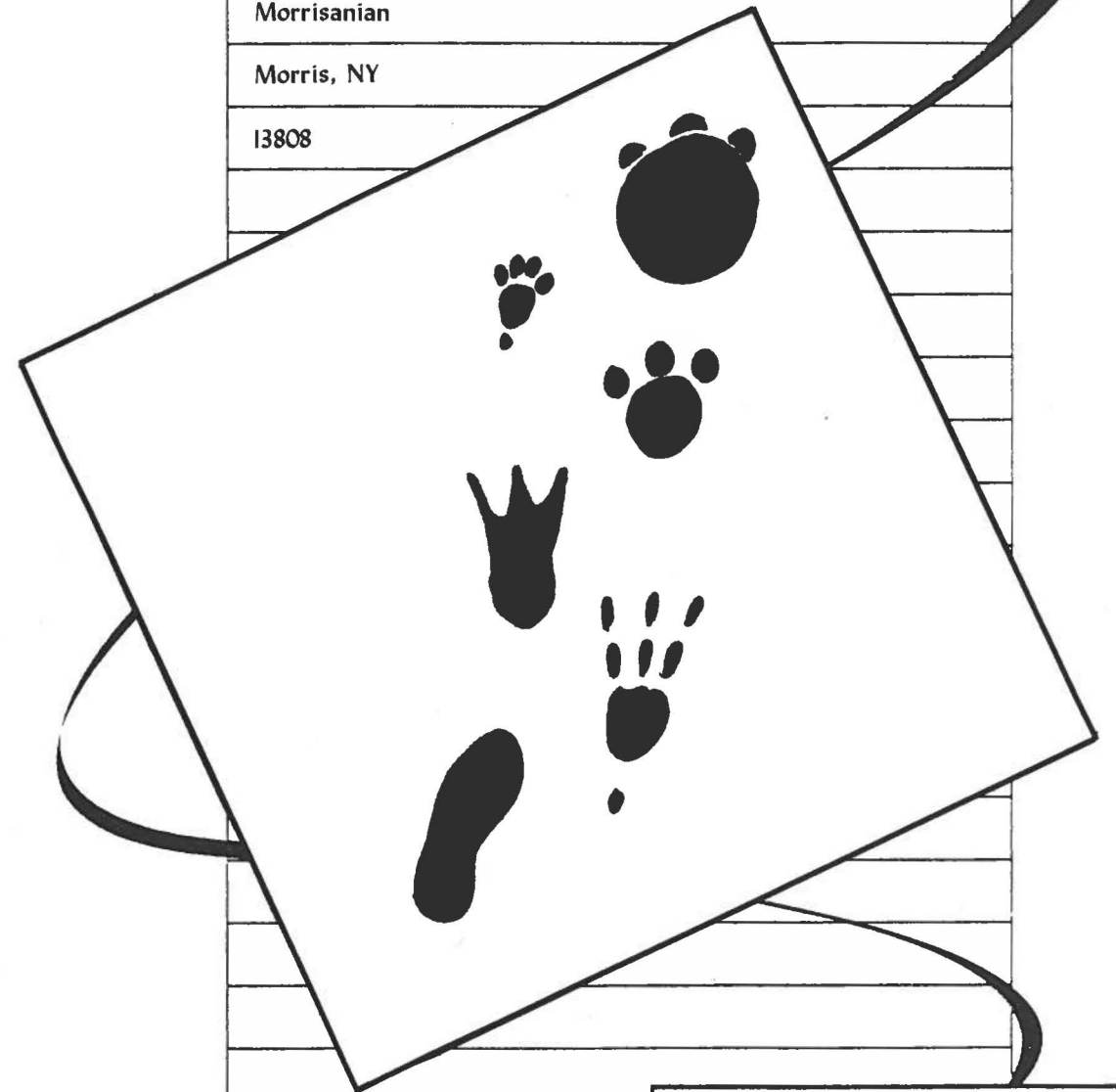

New Steps

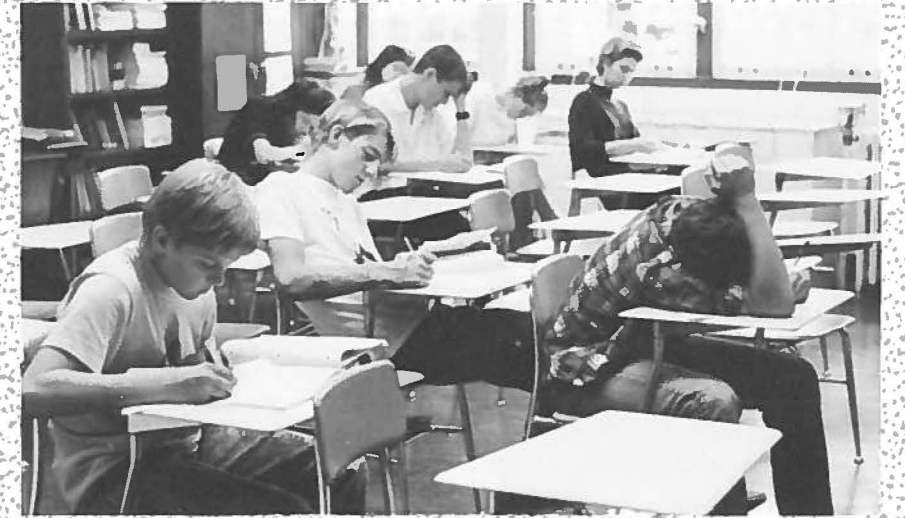

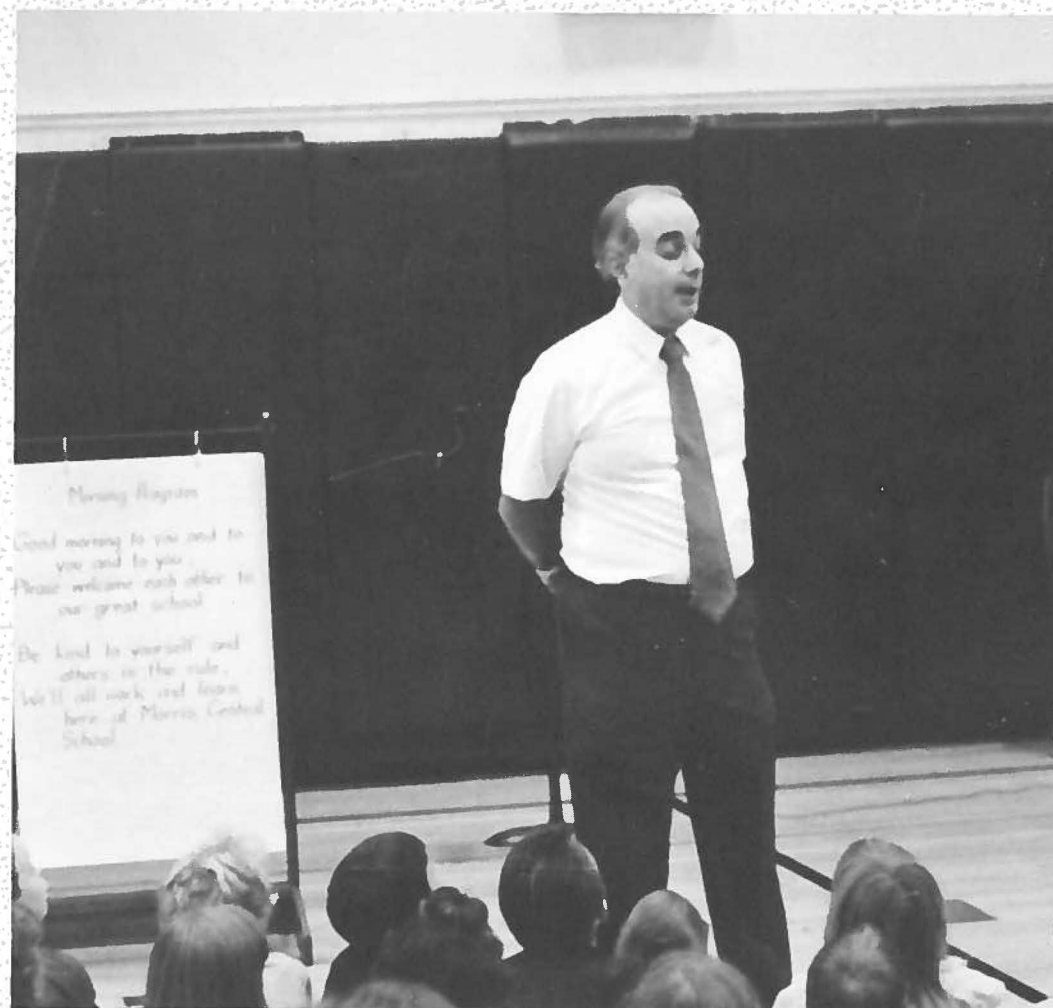

First Steps in the Morning

Mornings are a little bit different and definitely more exciting this year at Morris Central. For the first time, Morris instituted a Morning Program. Everyday from 8:30 until 8:45 the kindergarten through third grade assemble in the gym for songs, menu readings, the pledge, announcements, commemoration of birthdays, and lessons. According to Mr. Creme, "This program was established because at Morris Central we believe that beginning each school day together will cultivate positive feelings about self, others, school, and community. A child's positive self-concept promotes personal and academic success." We have this program because of a grant written by some of our elementary teachers. The morning breakfast program is also in its first full year. The cafeteria is open from 8:10, serving cereal, toast, bagels, milk, and juice.

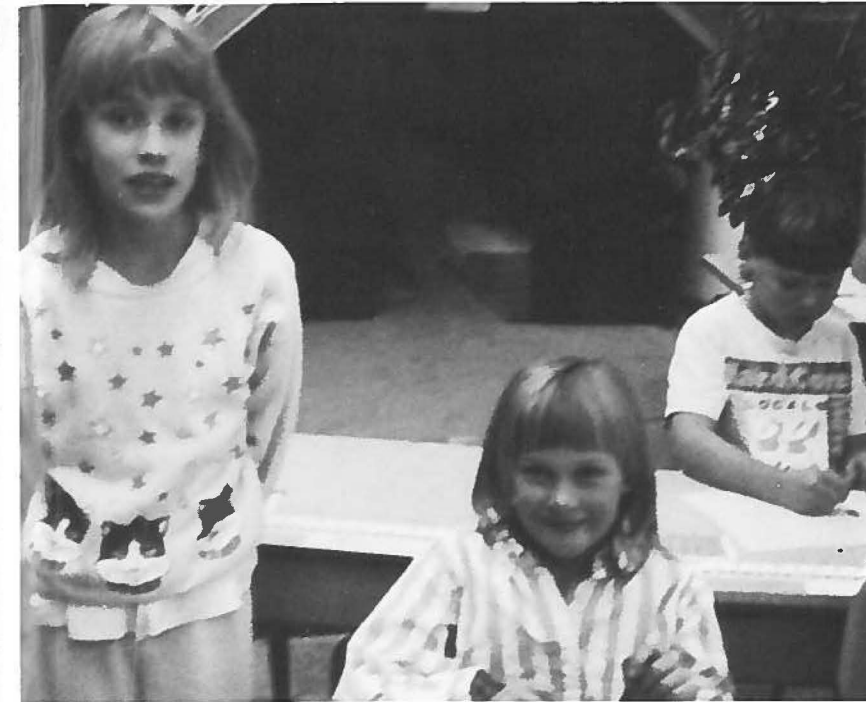

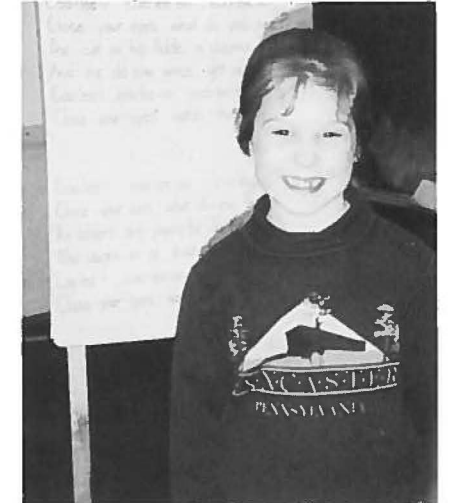

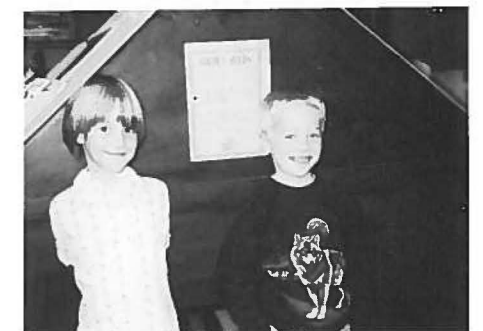

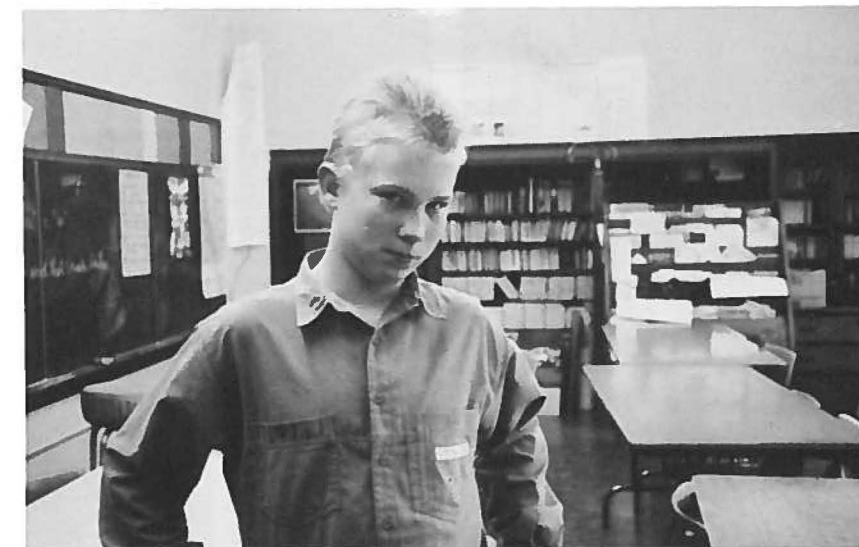

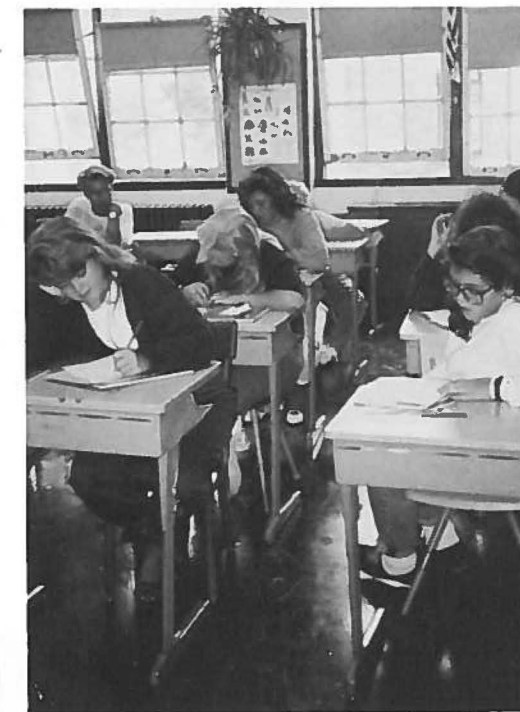

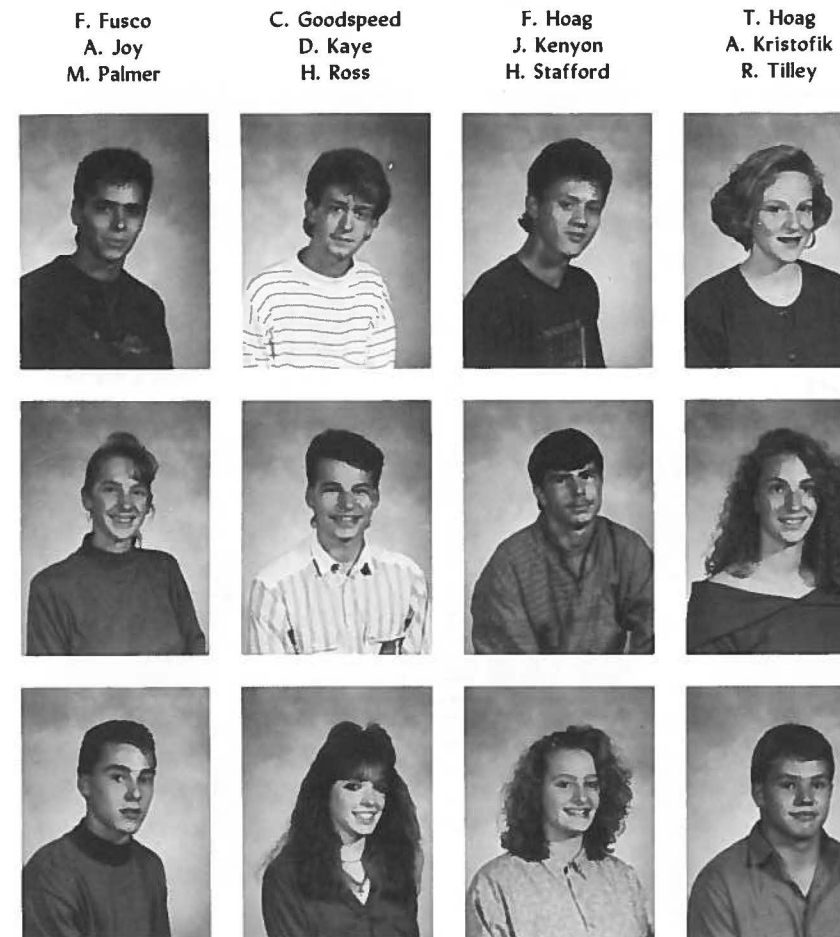

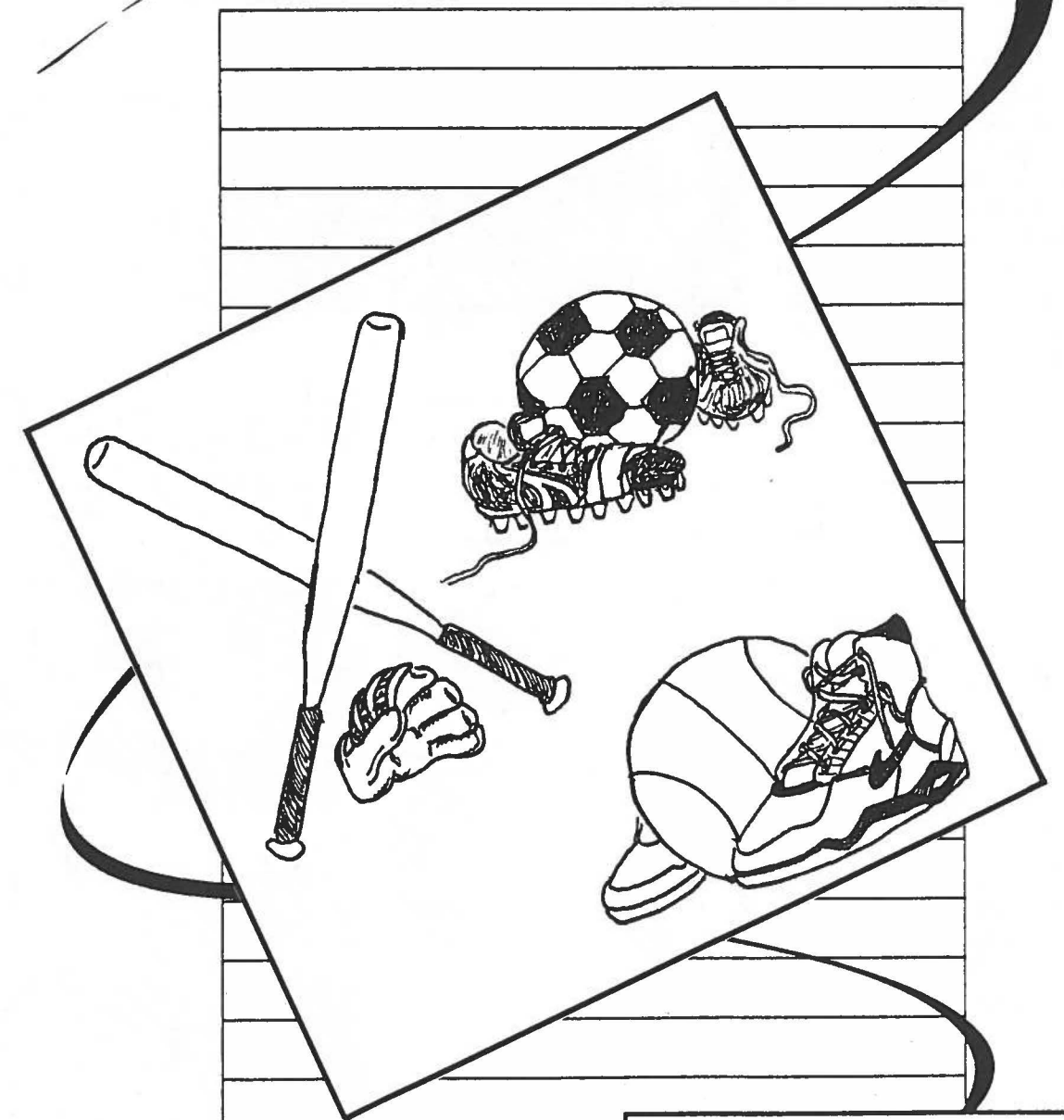

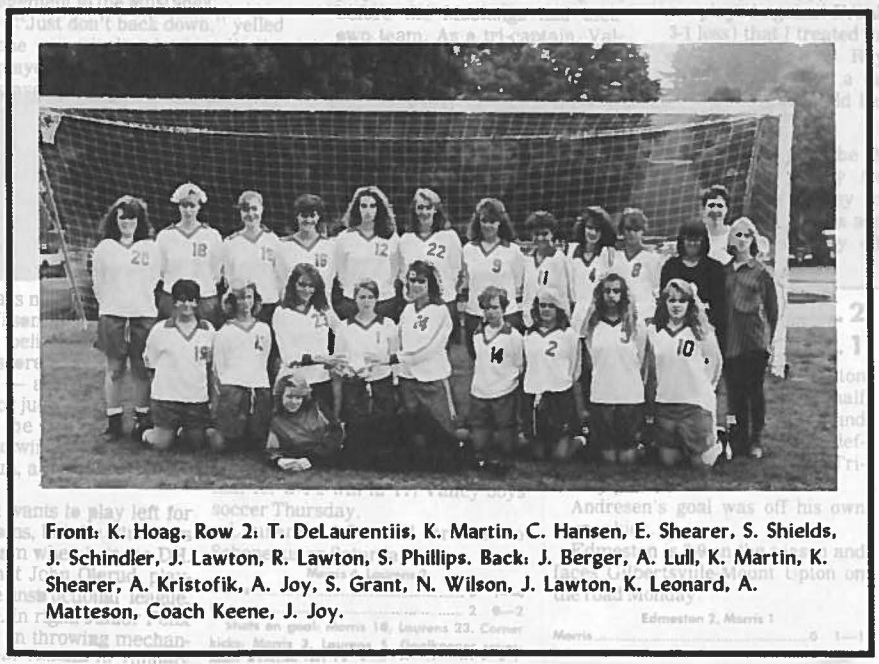

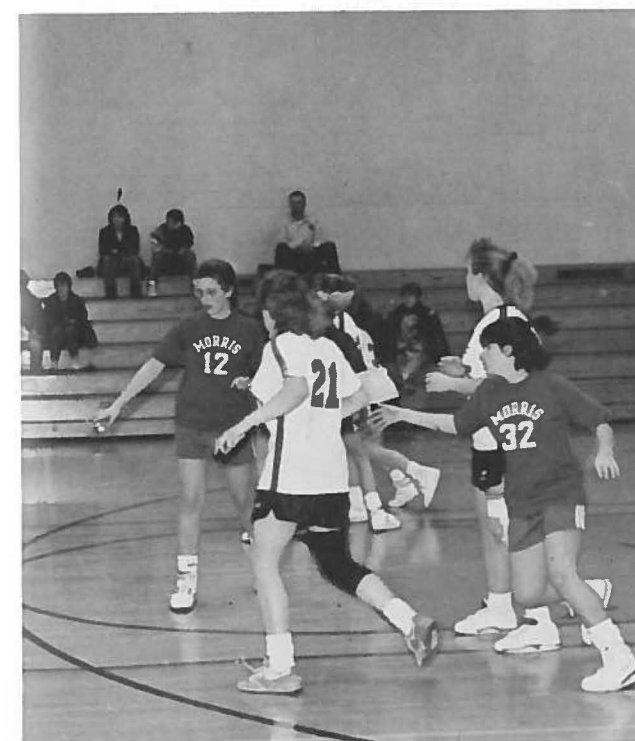

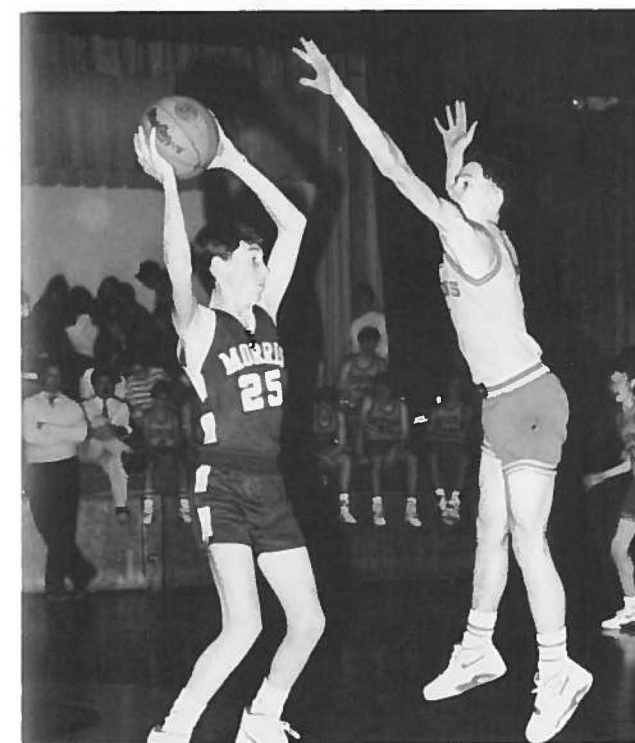

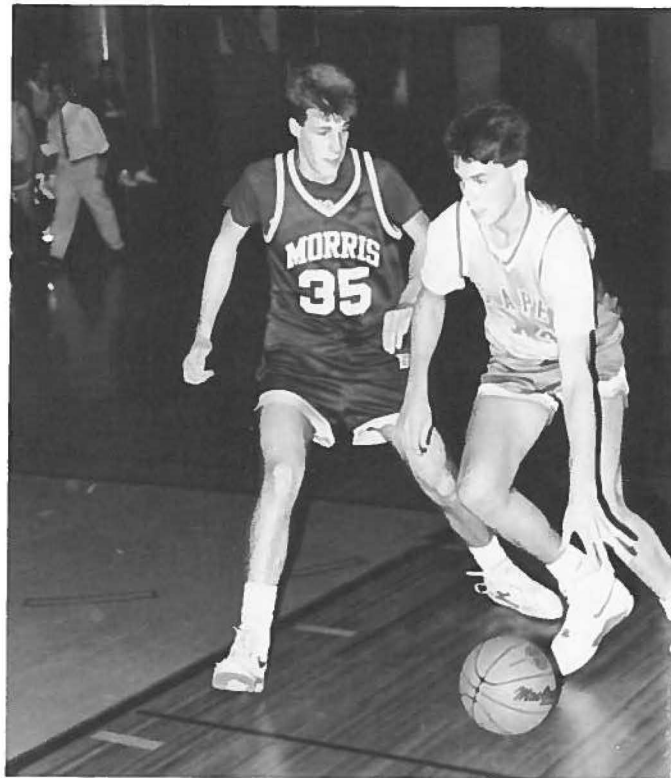

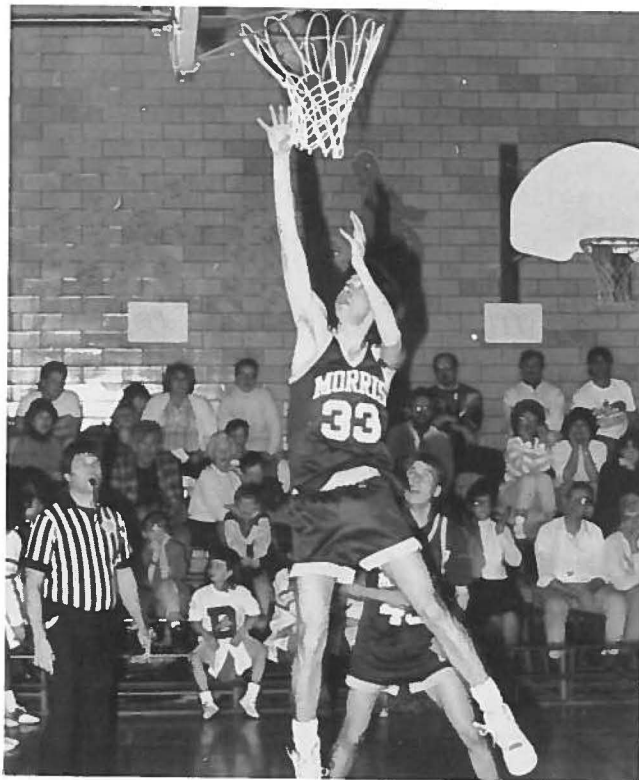
