He paddled around the docks which skirt the lakefront and entered the Susquehanna near Council Rock. Only a few stragglers were in the area when it all began, and it is doubtful whether many of these knew what was going on at the time. Also on hand were Mr. Chaffee's wife, and their three children. No prior public an-nouncement had been made of the

He made it through the shallow rapids about 14 miles to just north of Portlandville the first day, and camped out in a cow pasture along the river's banks. From then on, however, the swim didn't go unnoticed. The farther along he got, the more interest his feat created. 
