

Chaffee Ends Historic Swim Of Susquehanna

Russell H. Chaffee climbed out of the water in Havre de Grace, Md. late Monday afternoon to complete the first recorded swim of the 440-mile Susquehanna River.

The 38-year-old Sayre, Pa. high school mathematics teacher received a celebratory welcome as he left the water at the yacht basin in Havre de Grace where the Susquehanna flows into Chesapeake Bay.

Accompanied most of the way by four Boy Scouts from Sayre, paddling two canoes and carrying gear required for the trip, Mr. Chaffee stepped into Otsego Lake shortly after noon on Tuesday, June 14, to begin the historic swim.

He paddled around the docks which skirt the lakefront and entered the Susquehanna near Council Rock. Only a few stragglers were in the area when it all began, and it is doubtful whether many of these knew what was going on at the time. Also on hand were Mr. Chaffee's wife and their three children. No prior public announcement had been made of the forthcoming swim.

He made it through the shallow rapids about 14 miles to just north of Portlandville the first day, and camped out in a cow pasture along the river's banks. From then on, however, the swim didn't go unnoticed. The farther along he got, the more interest his feat created.

After the second night out at Oneonta, Mr. Chaffee and his young companions were welcomed by civic leaders in towns along the river, and given the red carpet treatment. They were housed in hotels and motels along the way and otherwise made most welcome.

During the four-week trip, Mr. Chaffee averaged a little better than 15 miles a day. He encountered shallow water, rocks, dams and other hazards, but solved satisfactory all the problems these presented.

The last day of the swim, he covered eight miles in tide water, with the tide against him all the way.

On Tuesday, Mr. Chaffee was in Gettysburg, Pa. for the start of a four-day P-TA workshop to which he was committed prior to the start of his swim.

Ron Philo of Schenectady was low amateur with a 66. Steve Jastrowski of Cooperstown, only local amateur in the field, had a 38-42-80.
