

GREENE COUNTY IN PARAGRAPHS

Items Regarding Matters of General Interest

The work of curbing the main street in Cairo began last Wednesday. When completed, according to the Cairo Herald, it will be the finest street in Greene county.

Tannersville's new sewerage system will be in operation within the time fixed by the contract, namely: August 21st. That date probably will be somewhat anticipated and the plant will be ready to go into partial operation before that time.

Charles Alle of Prattsville, owner of the Mohican bus lines, Stamford to Catskill, has sold his 16-passenger gray bus to Mr. Tallman of Durham, who conducts the Cooksburg-Albany bus line.
