

Morris woman drowns in pond

MORRIS — An elderly Morris resident, Miss Deane Klinghoffer, 70, drowned Wednesday in Hargrove Lake only a few hundred feet from the Orange County Fair Grounds at Morris.

Morris Police Chief Robert Hoffman said Miss Klinghoffer's body was discovered about 2:45 a.m. yesterday by two Morris boys, John Maricic and William Durick, who came running to his Chief Station with the Police Chief and a patrol officer.

Chief Hoffman said the boys were standing near the sickle office on the hill grounds.

Chief Hoffman said he believed the boys in the case, a body of water known locally as Morris Pond, and found the body of Miss Klinghoffer, fully clothed and wearing her shoes.

Floting face downwards in the water about four feet from shore.

The police chief said he called three police and asked that the coroner be advised. Investigator Louis Sapp and Troopers R. Durick and Joseph Hoffman from Oneonta responded to the Orange County Coroner James L. Maricic.

Hoffman found a wallet of unidentified make by drawing Miss Klinghoffer's name from it.

But it wasn't until a retired secretary who formerly worked at the Lion Trooper plant in Morris, looking for her name with Miss Maricic's First, Linda R. Morris, that the body was returned to the Oneonta Police Station, Morris, where arrangements are pending.
